


# New ements

#### Use Flashcards!


Make flash cards while studying. This will take less time when you want to revise a topic with in short study sessions with greater results.


#### Teach Others or Yourself!




#### **Preclinical Questions**

A 68-year-old female makes an appointment with her family physician for evaluation of right areolar pain and nipple discharge for 2 weeks. On physical examination, the nipple has multiple fissures and mild erythema, but is otherwise normal in appearance. A firm, non-tender, fixed 1 x 1 cm sub-areolar mass is palpated. A shave biopsy of the nipple revealed large cells with pale-staining cytoplasm and prominent nucleoli. Histologic evaluation of the shave biopsy revealed what cell type that is the hallmark of this disease?





However, in the flipped classroom model, learning is flipped. As you can see from the pyramid, students can finish the lower level of cognitive work before class. Then, when they come to class, they can engage in higher cognitive levels of learning with their peers and teacher present.
